## **Taking Action on Plastics**

Ireland is the EU's top producer of plastic waste and until recently we, along with other European countries, have been exporting it to China. In 2016, China took 95% of our plastic waste, but, in 2017, announced that it would no longer take this waste from European countries. One of the main reasons for this is that the plastic was often poorly sorted and even contaminated because it was not clean when packaged for export. A Chinese government campaign – Operation Green Fence – begun in 2013 led to a clamp down on the import of low quality waste through improved inspections of container ships. These new regulations impacted on Ireland last year when 160 containers of green bin waste from Ireland en route to China were stopped in Rotterdam because of contamination. China's refusal to take Europe's waste is a wake-up call. We can't continue exporting the problem, so we need to address it at home.

Our government recently announced new recycling guidelines in order to clarify what exactly we can put into the Green Bin. These guidelines will, hopefully, help us to cleanly recycle what we can; but what if we could cut down altogether? We all know the amount of packaging there is on most things now...much of it plastic.....and, sadly, what is not recycled ends up in landfill and in our waterways and oceans.

## What Can We Do

## Some Practical Suggestions

- 1. Use a cloth bags, a basket or recyclable plastic bag when shopping.
- 2. Resist buying food and other products with excess packaging.
- 3. Encourage retailers, where you can, to recycle plastic containers.
- 4. Use a refillable water bottle and glass food jars.
- 5. Drink freshly prepared juices instead of buying juice in plastic bottles.
- 6. For that take away cup of coffee, tea or hot chocolate bring your own cup!
- 7. Avoid the use of plastic straws and plastic cutlery.
- 8. Buy washing powder in boxes as the cardboard is easier to recycle.
- 9. Make your own cleaning products that will be less toxic and eliminate the need for multiple plastic bottles of cleaner.
- 10. Whenever possible use items not made from plastic.
- 11. When possible, opt for natural fibre clothing (like cotton, wool, hemp, linen, etc) over synthetics like polyester, lycra, etc.
